



- Non-communicable diseases
 - Lobby United Nations to address cancer, diabetes, and other chronic disease as part of multi-lateral agreements and international development initiatives.
- Health systems
 - Partner with global organizations to demonstrate and communicate how existing programs and resources can be leveraged to prevent, detect, and treat cancer.
- Empowerment campaigns
 - Develop and advise messaging that emphasizes survivorship and counters fear and discrimination.
